## RAILROADS AND SUCCESS

"Springfield congratulates Coos Bay" and "Natron Cut-off Next," are the slogans that will be distributed at the Marshfield railroad jubilee by the Springfield people today. Fifteen thousand of these little slips will be scattered among the throngs of people. We, the people of Springfield do congratulate Coos Bay on getting one other means of transportation. May this jubilee held for three short days just be the beginning of greater things in commercial development for the Coos country.

America owes her commercial supremacy to the rapid growth and development of her means of transportation and communication. The communities of the United States that have ranked highest as commercial centers are the ones that have had the greatest advantage in transportation. There is no use in the farmer raising a surplus of produce if he can't ship it to market; there is no use of the manufacturer to turn the wheels of his factory if he cannot distribute his products by means of water and rail carriers.

Coos Bay has had only one means of commercial communication with the world—the Pacific ocean. Now she has access to the best valley in the world, through which she can find markets for her products and find products for her own use. Her resources may be developed in a way that was not possible when shipping depended entirely on the high seas.

"Natron Cut-off Next." This is the song of Springfield. If this country is going to realize its biggest and best development we must have direct communication with eastern states. When the Natron cut-off is completed and the railroad now being built through eastern Oregon is connected up, we will be on the shortest transcontinental railroad from Chicago to the Pacific. The completion of the Willamette-Pacific puts Springfield 120 miles within a deep sea harbor and will reduce freight rates from San Francisco and Seattle.

Springfield needs the Natron cut-off. The whole upper Willamette valley needs the Natron cut-off. The chances are that when the Natron cut-off is finished, the Springfield car shops will be finished. Let us try and convince the railroads that this road will be a paying proposition both for the corporation and for the people.

## HOW ABOUT YOUR EDUCATION?

A little more than three weeks and school time will be here again. It is time for the young man and the young woman to begin to think seriously of the future. Are you going back to school this fall? Have you finished the high school course? Are you going to college? No? Have you had enough education or does it cost too much?

No one who has had any experience with the hard knocks of the business world will say that things would not have been a little easier if he had gone to school a few years longer. No man who has had a good education has ever been heard to remark that it was a waste of time to go to college.

If it is worth while it is worth a sacrifice and it is worth hard work.
