To conlinue the present policy of co-ordinate regulation by the federal other places the visitors will wish to government and by forty-eight states, with diverging and conflicting interests and ideas often purely local in character but general in harmful effect, is to construct uniform improvement and prevent efficient and economic developement of railway and transportation service as a whole.

A chain is no stronger than the weakest link, and, so far as interstate commerce and national efficiency of the railroads are concerned, unless the railroads as a unit are improved, developed and adjusted to the general needs of the public along the line of a well concieved general plan, economic and efficient service can hardly be expected. For example, considering the general plan of efficiency. of what benifit would its facilities be if the connecting carrier was not able to recieve and handle the traffic? Or, in what respect would through service be improved if all the roads leading into Chicago increased thier Grace Walker and Alice Kester. facilities and improved thier service unless the connecting lines out were able to handle the business? It would simply mean congestion and delay.

For this reason the whole scheme of transportation regulation and development should be uniform and gen- school. eral and the Interstate Commerce Commerce Commission should be invested with complete authority and control, the present state commissions being included in the plan of organization as regional commissions . Such a plan contemplates making the whole system of transportation and regulation uniform, harmonious and efficient There is interstate and intrastate mail service just as there is interstate and intrastate freight service, but the public wisely confides to the federal government exclusive regulation of the mails and would not even entertain a suggestion of co-ordinated regulation by the states. Apart from essential privacy and merchandising of postage every reason sustaining exclusive federal regulation of the postal service may be urged in support of exclusive federal regulation of all in Cagley, supt. terstate corriers and commerce.



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
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
