HOP PICKING IS IN LIME LIGHT IN LANE THESE DAYS

Rains Do Not See mto Have Any Serious Effect on This Year's Hop Crop

The wet weather of the early part of the week alarmed the hop growers on account of mold and lice but the ardor of the pickers does not appear to be dampened. Two coaches and a baggage car were needed on Wendling train number 93 to bring the crowd of hop pickers from Cottage Grove Sunday and several wagons conveyed the new comers to the James Seavey hop yard. Every day many local pickers move their camp effects to various hop yards.

Most of the early hops are picked now and the late hops will be picked in a comparatively short time. The first load of dry hops was received at the Springfield Feed company warehouse last Friday from the Palmer brothers hop yard.

The price of hops this season is not equal to the cost of production at the present time and, with the exception of those having their hops contracted, their crops. The time and labor to spray the hops seems to be almost a complete loss on account of weather conditions.

Picking began at the Ivanhoe ranch Tuesday. About 125 pickers are employed there. At the James Seavey yard picking began this morning with about 900 pickers. The other yards are also busy harvesting their crops and every one desiring employment at this work have been accommodated.

EUGENE BOSSE DIES IN PORTLAND HOSPITAL

Prominent Eugene Resident Found Unconscious at Hotel After Stroke of Paralysis Died Last Night

Eugene Bosse of Eugene, died at the Good Samaritan hospital at Portland last night following a stroke of paralysis which occurred sometime Tuesday night.

He was found unconscious at the Perkins hotel there yesterday morning and taken to the hospital in an unconscious condition. He did not regain consciousness.

Mr. Bosse, who was 76 years old, was born in Belgium, coming to this country when a young man. He was prominently connected with the Commercial club of Eugene and was also the propagator of the flax industry in the state. It was in the interests of this work that he made his visit to Portland, arriving in the city several days ago.

Mr. E. J. Hansett of Salem, his daughter, is the only surviving relative.
