## "MEXICAN VAGARIES"

In an editorial on the aspects of the Mexican attitude toward the United States the New York Times aims to set straight some of the short sighted politicians who are going about the country with their "57 varieties" of solutions.

Bullfighting has been the foremost national pastime in Mexico. The torador has been the people's hero, in Mexico City the vast amphitheatre is generally crowded at all notable exhibitions. There is no question in northern minds of the brutality and unfairness of the sport. A picador may be gored to death or crushed by his falling horse once in a while, but the poor bull has never a chance. The horses sent into the ring are doomed to slaughter. The smell of their blood seems to intoxicate the spectators. The seats in the lower tiers are the favorite ones; the nearer the Mexican can get to the carnage, the better he likes it. Sober-minded observers have frequently argued that such exhibitions have been essential to the welfare of the State, as they have satisfied a craving of the people which would have found more dangerous outlets if bullfighting were abolished. But Carranza has abolished bullfighting with a stroke of the pen, for various excellent reasons which commend themselves to the humane. He declares that the needlessly endanger the lives of men, torture beasts, provoke sanguinary sentiments.

The lives of men, however, have been needlessly endangered in many other ways in Mexico, ever since Father Hidalgo raised the flag of rebellion. There has been a veritable debauchery of killing. That disregard for human life continues. In Northern Mexico no decent man or woman is safe; and admirable as Carranza's decree against assassination backed by force would be more timely. It is by no means certain that he can prevent bullfighting by making it illegal. Assassination is illegal in Mexico, but the northern assassins are unquelled.

Another remarkable manifestation of the awakening of the humane spirit among the Mexicans is the demand of the Republican Rationalist Party, which proposes to have something to say about the choice of a new Congress and the legislation to be enacted, for the abolition of capital punishment. Until lately it has been the Mexican custom frequently to put criminals to death without even the formality of a trial, and death has often been the punishment for trivial crimes. That the new movement is more than a mere bid for foreign approval will generally be believed. Carranza is undoubtedly sincere in his desire to suppress bullfighting and to turn the minds of the people toward gentler sports. In an era when illegal killing has not been suppressed, the Republican Rationalists honestly oppose legal killing. As a psychological manifestation this is interesting. As an indication of the development of a people toward a sound ideal of self-government it may be compared with the transformation by the French Jacobins of the Cathedral of Notre Dame into the temple of their flamboyant Goddess of Reason. They revolted against years of misrule and iniquity in the Church as the Mexican leaders have revolted against the tyranny that substituted force and cruelty for justice and catered to the worst passions of the people in order to keep them in subjection. As a step in the upbuilding of a State it is akin to putting ornaments on the roof before the foundations are laid.

There is yet no sign of the formation of a stable Government in Mexico. The rebellion against Carranza has not been suppressed. The country is liable for huge damages. Nothing is done to meet the requirements of the situation. Carranza's Commissioners fritter away their time in Atlantic City by persisting in their demand that we shall cease our precautions against invasions by murderous bands who re-

fuse allegiance against us because our Government has recognized his authority. Before he takes measures to make his State ideal Carranza must endeavor to make it habitable and to establish its credit. When that is done, the actual suppression alike of bullfighting and capital punishment will favorably impress the rest of mankind.

**ECHOES FROM STATE**  
**W. C. T. U. CONVENTION**

Mrs. Mary B. Cambell, Lane county president of the Women's Christian Temperance Union, has just returned from the state convention held at Pendleton from Tuesday evening, October 17 until Friday evening October 20, and has given the following sketch of the trip and meeting.

"I left Eugene at 4:30 Tuesday morning, and went to Portland from where about 60 of us left at 10 o'clock in a special car. We had a fine trip. Among other pleasures, a five minute stop was made at Multnomah falls. One interesting event of the trip was the discovery of a mother and a family of five girls, the small ones being triplets. We recruited these for the W. C. T. U.

"We took a straw vote of all the passengers on the train and reelected Wilson by a majority of 21. The vote was Wilson, 49; Hughes, 28; Hanley, 20. We also took a vote on the Brewer's amendment and on the dry amendment. The former was defeated by 91 to 6 and the latter carried by 91 to 5.

"We arrived at Pendleton at five o'clock in the afternoon in a blinding sandstorm. We were met at the train by a delegation with automobiles, who took us to our lodging places. The next morning everything was frozen so stiff that the ground fairly squeaked. No Eastern Oregon for mine.

"The meetings were splendid. A good year was reported all through. The different conditions prevailing in the dry and wet states and the discussion of the wet and dry amendments was really the theme of the meetings.

"The same officers were returned with the exception of the vice president. Mrs. Jennie M. Kemp is president as before.

"At a banquet given Wednesday evening, among other numbers on the program was a sextet of Indians who sang in the Umatilla tongue. It was at this time that Mayor Foster and representatives of five official bodies gave addresses of welcome.

"On Thursday evening there was a diamond medal contest, the medal being won by Miss Willis of Newburg. There were six contestants. On the program was an Indian, who made a very good speech in broken words, and 14 other braves, dressed in native costume, who sang. Their music sounded a great deal like the bass notes of a pipe organ."
