SUPERVISION OF STATE BANK+ AND TRUST COMPANIES

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BY MARY HARDING The State Banking board is composed of the Governor, Secretary of State, and State Treasurer. Its duties are Banking Department.

The Banking Department consists of a superintendent, assistant superintendent, three examiners, office assistant, and stenographer. The total salaries of these amount to \$10,-840.00 per annum. It is the superintendent's duty to see that the laws concerning banking are enforced, to regulate the business of loaning money, to appoint the three examiners, to suggest new laws, and to help lift the banks of this state to a higher plane of efficiency, safety and conservatism. The examiners have the work of examining the different banks and making reports concerning their solvency. They also have charge of the liquidation of insolvency banks; and have the authority to say whether or not new banks shall be organized. The purpose of the State Banking Department, in general, is to co-operate with the Banking Board in making every bank safe and free from insolv-

Eight years of Oregon bank supervision were ended December 31, 1915. During this time the number of State banks and trust companies increased from one hundred thirty two to one hundred seventy-one banks and five trust companies. Their resources increased approximately from \$53,421,543.58 to \$62,351,777.39.

During the year, six new State banks were organized with a total capitalization of \$145,000.00. One bank increased its capitalization \$5,000.00 and four banks decreased their capital \$96,000.00. Four banks consolidated with other institutions, two voluntarily liquidated their business, and one was closed by the Department. During Noveber 1915 three banks were in charge of the Banking Department for liquidation.

Of one hundred seventy-four State banks the capital smounts to \$8,524,-250.00. The demand, time and savings, and United State postal deposits amount to \$44,284,999.35. The total resources are \$62,351,777.39.
