 Jects it would receive \$500 the first year and \$10,000 in the tenth year and thereafter. The total for the first year would, therefore, be \$15,000 for the first year, gradually increasing to \$53,800 in the tenth year and thereafter, or a total for the first ten years of \$341,230.
