COMMON LAWLESSNESS.

Springfield has found little use for a jail or a police judge this year. So far only ten cases have been tried before local police Judge Walker and only three of these cases were dealt with through the town lockup. It seems that the criminal tendencies in this town are nearly at nil so far as the police are concerned.

There is one kind of lawlessness that the police have been unable to cope with effectively—destroying property. It seems that certain youngsters make it their business to take things from other people's yards that do not belong to them. The last reported case was that of some boys raiding a holly bush at the corner of Fifth and B streets. The owners of this property had spent quite a lot of time and considerable money to make their lawn and flower beds look nice during the growing season. They, like many other families believed that it was not necessary to build a fence around their yard in order to have their rights respected.

Springfield is sadly in need of properties that are well taken care of with shrubs, flowers and lawns. There are some families in the town that take pride in keeping their properties looking nice. They should not have to be continually running the risk of having a band of boys

come along some night and destroy a whole year's work in a few minutes.

Severe measures should be dealt out to the persons who do not respect the property rights of others. If the boys do not have flowers and shrubs at home they should not take those belonging to others. There is no place on this continent where it is easier to grow beautiful vegetation than right here in Springfield. There is no excuse for those who want flowers not having them. A little work is all that is necessary to have beautiful yards and lawns.
