THREE NEUTRAL KINGS IN CONFERENCE

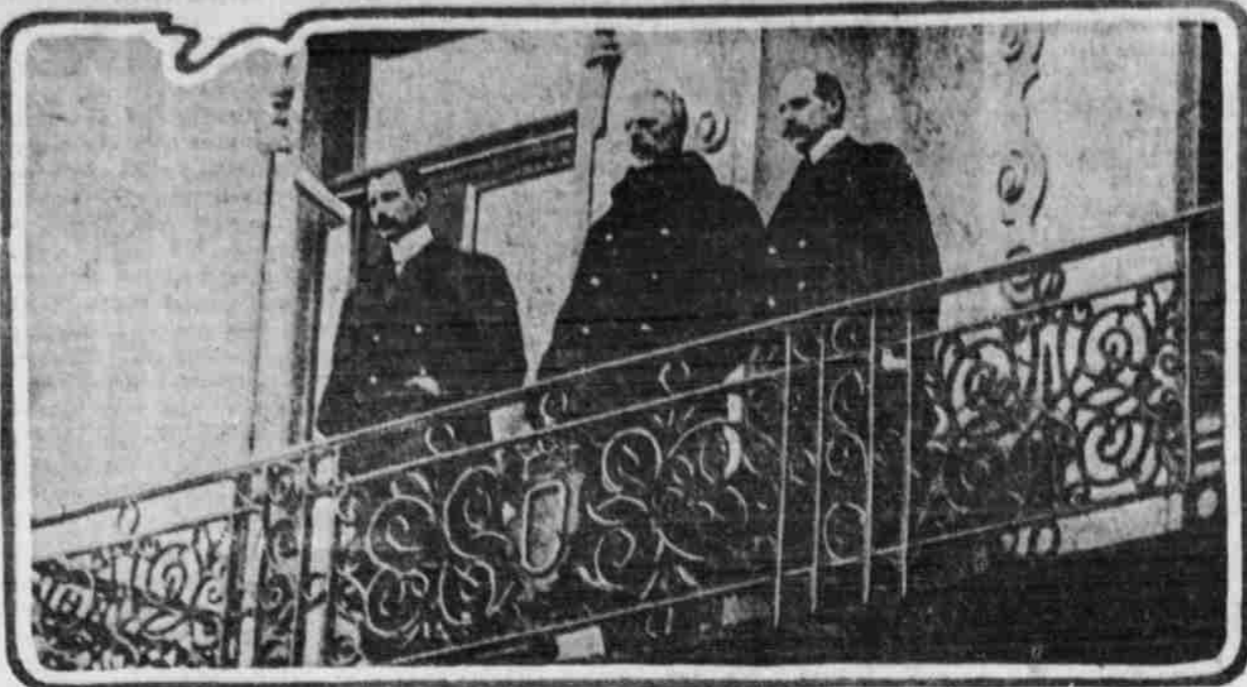

and the state land board must be given machinery for the operation of the system.

Normal School Question. The normal school question is destined to raise its head once more. Pendleton has not given up hope for the establishment of an eastern Oregon normal school. Ashland wants the southern Oregon normal reestablished at that place, and an effort will be made to have the legislature refer a measure to the general election of 1918, providing for the establishment of normals at both these places.

Rigid retrenchment by the legislature will be absolutely necessary, because of the passage of the 6 percent tax limitation amendment. The estimated requirements of the state are fixed at \$9,317,528.46 by the state budget, and under the amendment there will be a shortage of \$715,382.09. To devise ways and means to conduct the state government in the next two years within the appropriation allowed by the amendment will be the big problem of the session, and it will devolve on the ways and means committee to solve it.

Governor Withycombe believes that he has solved it, and much of his message will be devoted to it. He will suggest two methods—general retrenchment and a slight increase in the fees of some of the revenue-producing departments. Possibly the issuance of bonds will be necessary. If the state is to continue road building as in the past, and at the same time avail itself of federal appropriations for road work by matching them dollar for dollar. The governor is opposed to bonding, however, if it is possible to avoid it.
