HE CALLS IT "PROGRESS."

Ignorance is bliss, especially when one talks of something he knows little about. Our friend of the 'Valley Progress' at Junction City would revolutionize the publishing profession by murdering in cold blood all such organizations known as Editorial Associations. Just because this worthy gentleman has broken into the publishing profession of which he apparently knows little, and because he knows less of the meaning of the word "co-operation" as it is applied to the printing business, he would kill off any organization that is in its design created to aid his own business. This man has a personal spite against one of the members of the local editorial association and now he wants to do his worst to kick all of the other members of the association in the back.

We should like to ask our free-lance contemporary where the law and medical professions would be today if it were not for the influence these professions gain through their own organizations to raise the standards used by their members. These professions are considered the highest in their standard and ethics. The members through co-operative associations have had state legislatures make laws that would raise the requirements to gain admission to the profession and would at the same time guarantee better service to the public.

The newspaper men of Oregon have had a late start in trying to raise the standard of their lot. Their organization is just beginning to get results. It is working to benefit the general public by having sane legislation enacted that will benefit the taxpayer. At the same time the standards of the publishing profession are going to a higher plane.

What sort of school teachers would we have if each teacher learned his own teaching methods by actual experience, not having the benefits of the failures and experiences of other teachers? What sort of lawyers would we have if the lawyer to be should study science and then without any definite and practical knowledge of the profession plunge into practicing law? What sort of newspapers would we have here in the Willamette valley if all of the editors and owners of plants had jumped into the business without knowing the difference between an advertisement and some framed up lines of type set at random that serves little more than to fill up space?

If experience makes better teachers; if co-operation makes better lawyers; if preparation makes better physicians; could not experience, co-operation and preparation be applied to the newspaper profession? We take it for granted that our contemporary never belonged to a teachers' organization and that he would not think of attending a

meeting of the State Bar Association.

We notice that the name to the sheet in which this article appeared is called "Progress." We can match this style of newspaper with many a one published in the days of our fathers. We admit since it is only six months old that a new style may have been created or the old style sheet may have been revived.

The Oregon State Editorial Association had a successful meeting at Salem Friday and accomplished its purpose. Nearly 25 editors from all parts of the state attended. Some of these editors have been at the business for more than a score of years. They have not learned all of the ins and outs of publishing newspapers yet. They try to take advantage of the experience of their contemporaries. We hope that our friend of the "Valley Progress" will someday get over the freshman stage in publishing and attend a meeting of an Editorial Association and discover how much his brother publishers might know that would save him many a hard bump.

the grading, inspection and weighing of grain and hay, and an important readjustment of the horticultural code.

Under the act the department will be under the direction of one commissioner who is appointed by the governor, and who receives his position because of his practical knowledge of the branches under his control. He will give a bond of \$10,000. There will be five divisions of the department, each under the supervision of a director. These divisions are those of dairies and pure foods, livestock, horticulture, agricultural fairs, and grain and hay.

The commissioner and the directors will each receive an annual salary of \$2400. Two advisory boards on the state fair and on livestock are created to serve without compensation except their actual expenses.

The measuring, weighing and warehousing of grain and hay are hedged about by solid protections for those concerned. The revisions of the horticultural code are also extensive.

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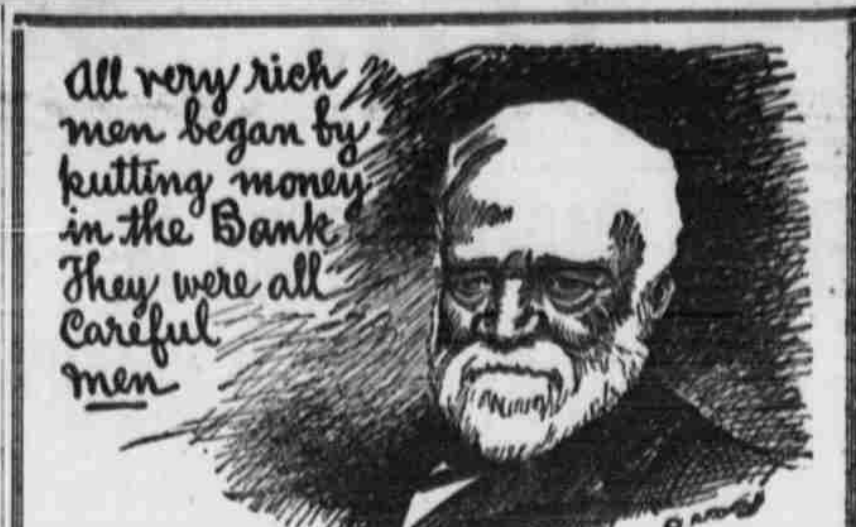
