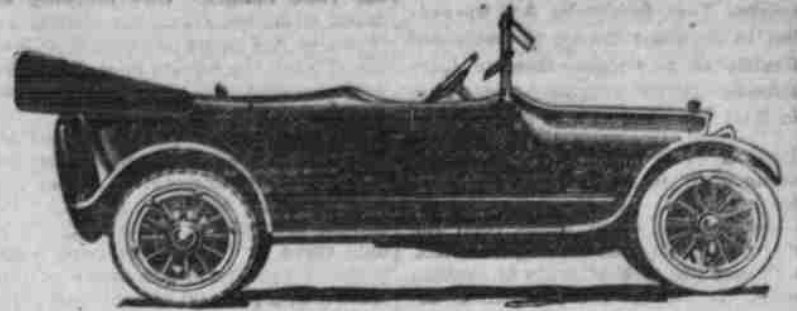
## FATHER AND SON SIT IN NEXT CONGRESS

### TREE OVER 150 YEARS OLD.

Rings Show a Walnut Had Become That Old Before It Was Cut.

Shelbyville, Mo. — W. J. Norris, a dealer in walnut lumber from northeast Missouri, is completing a remarkable harvest near Shelbyville. The timber is being taken from a 100 acre tract of land belonging to G. W. Hope and will make approximately 50,000 feet of lumber.

It is unusual to find so many trees of such superior quality on so small an acreage.

As determined by the number of annual rings, the average age of the trees was forty years. One large tree showed 152 annual rings, measured forty-two feet to the first limb and cut out two sixteen-foot logs thirty inches in diameter. The last large logs and the bases are to be used making veneering, while the other logs will be used for airplane lumber.

### BET HE'D WIN BRIDE.

Best Man Willingly Pays Over Wager He Had Lost.

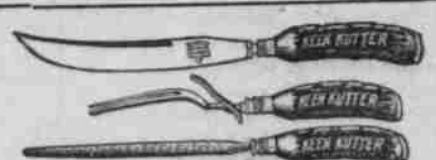
