

Saves Eggs

SPONGE CAKE

- 1 cup sugar
- 1/2 cup water
- 3 eggs

DIRECTIONS.—Beat sugar and water until syrup spins a thread and add to the stiffly beaten whites of eggs, beating until the mixture is cold. Beat together three times the flour, salt and baking powder; beat yolks of eggs until thick; add a little at a time flour mixture and egg yolks alternately to white of egg mixture, stirring after each addition. Add 1/2 cup cold water and flavoring. Mix lightly and bake in moderate oven one hour.
