Government Will List Distributors

Department of Agriculture Asks Data on Marketing of Farm Products

More confirmation of the fact that Mrs. James L. Clark returned to the United States government cona very grave manner, and that it is taking active steps to combat it is shown by a letter just received by Assessor D P Burton of Lane county from the department of agriculture.

The communication, which asks the names of those connected with the marketing and distributing of foodstuffs, is as follows:

"The grave situation with which the nation is confronted at the present time makes it imperative that reliable data be available with respect to the sources of food products and the location of storage warehouses in which stocks of foodstuffs are held. This office is endeavoring to secure such data in connection with its duties required by congress with respect to the market and distribution of farm products.

"I am writing, therefore, to ask if you will give us from your tax rolls at the earliest practicable moment tha names and addresses of all the persons, firms, plants and factories in your county engaged in the following lines of business, indicated in each instance the principal business of the person or firm named:

"1. Canning, preserving, drying or rickling of foodstuffs of any kind, including the making of sauerkrout.

- "2. Making cheese.
- "3. Milling or storing rice. "4. Common storage of foodstuffs.
- "5. Operating a creamery."
