Judge J. W. Hamilton yesterday made an order staying all proceedings in the case of the city of Eugene against David Stephens, in which the city sues to condemn land for the tail race at the municipal power plant near Walterville, until the case of Stephens against the city of Eugene is finally decided in the supreme court. The latter case is the one in which Stephens sued the city for an injunction against running the water through his land. The circuit court gave him an injunction with the proviso that the city could, within 60 days, begin condemnation proceedings. This was done, but Stephens appealed.
