GENERAL KORNILOFF NEW IDOL OF ALL THE RUSSIANS

Hero of Successful Offensive in Galicia Was Born in a Log Cabin.

Russia is ringing with the name of the latest hero of the war, Lieutenant General L. G. Korniloff, victor of Galicia, whose astonishing feats first proved that the new advance is no mere flash in the pan.

From log cabin to general is the literal text of the chronicle of General Korniloff's career. Born forty-six years ago, son of a need stricken Karmalinsk Cossack in western Siberia, who later reared a large family on a plantation gained as the village clerk, young Korniloff early began rough forest work.

Next General Korniloff was an officer in the Guards and, being penniless, was obliged to serve in Turkistan. In the Japanese war he received the rank of colonel and was intrusted with a desperate mission—that of covering the retreat from Mukden of one of General Kuropatkin's shattered armies.

MEASURING A DRAFTED MAN.

He Must Come Up to Specifications Given Below to Be Accepted.

The doctors who examine the men for the draft army must follow the table given below for weight, height and chest measurements, all chest measurements to be taken on a level just above the nipple.

Table with columns: Height, Weight, Chest Measurement. Rows show specifications for different height ranges from 5' 1-12" to 6' 6-12".

The following variations below the standard given in the table are permissible when the applicant is active, has firm muscles and is evidently vigorous and healthy:

Table with columns: Height, Weight, Chest at Expiration. Rows show variations for height ranges from 5' 1-12" to 6' 6-12".

To be acceptable men below sixty-four inches in height must be of good physique, well developed and muscular.

Variations in weight above the standard are not disqualifying unless sufficient to constitute obesity. Unless exceptionally well proportioned men above six feet six inches in height should be rejected.

How to Send Mail to Men at Front

Designation of Division, Regiment, Company and Organization Must Be Given

Postmasters of Oregon are being urged by the war and postoffice departments to give as wide publicity as possible to the regulations governing the addressing of mail to soldiers of the American expeditionary forces now in France.

Letters, postcards and printed matter originating with such forces for transmission to the United States are subject to the same classification except as modified by the provisions covering letters indorsed "Soldier's Letter," and contained in section 406, postal laws and regulations.

All mail addressed to members of the expeditionary forces should bear the complete designation of the division, regiment, company and organization to which the addressee belongs, as well as the name and address of the sender, and be fully prepaid by postage stamps.

Following is a sample of the correct manner in which to address a letter: "John Smith Jr., Company X, Infantry, American Expeditionary Forces."

The letter should bear the usual stamp, and on the upper left hand corner of the envelope must be written the name of the sender such as: "Return to Mrs. John Smith, Blank street, Springfield, Ore."

EXEMPTION BOARD MEETS

Dr. Kuykendall of Eugene, Made President and M. Svarverud, Secretary

The Eugene district board for the exemptions from the war draft met Monday evening and organized as follows: Dr. W. Kuykendall, president and M. Svarverud, secretary.

The counties over which this board has jurisdiction are Benton, Coos, Curry, Douglas, Josephine, Jackson, Lincoln, Linn, Lake, Lane, Polk, and Klamath.

The duties of the board as prescribed in the book of rules and regulations are: "Such district boards shall review on appeal and affirm, modify, or reverse any decision of any local board having jurisdiction in the area in which any such district board has jurisdiction under the rules and regulations prescribed by the president. Such district boards shall have exclusive original jurisdiction within their respective areas to hear and determine all questions or claims for including or excluding or discharging persons or classes of persons from the selective draft, under the provisions of this act, not included within the original jurisdiction of such local boards."

"The decisions of such district boards shall be final except that, in accordance with such rules and regulations as the president may prescribe, he may affirm, modify or reverse any such decision."
