GENERAL KORNILOFF NEW IDOL OF ALL THE RUSSIANS

Hero of Successful Offensive In Galicia Was Born In a Log Cabin.

Russia is ringing with the name of the larest bero of the war, Lieutenant General L. G. Kernlloff, victor of Ga-Beia, whose astonishing feats first proved that the new advance is no mere flash in the pan. General Korntion is the most daring, chivalrous and scholarly officer in the army. For a romantic rise from humble origin Russian history has only one parallel -that of Michel Vassillevitch Lomono sof, fisherman's son, poet, philosopher, creator of the modern Russian language, in the first half of the eighteenth century.

From log cabin to general is the literal text of the chronicle of General Kornfloff's career. Born forty-six years ago, son of a need stricken Karnalinsk Cossack in western Siberia, who later reared a large family on a pittance gained as the village clerk, young Korniloff early began rough forest work. At the age of nine he received his first instruction. When barely thirteen he by his own exertions and all night studies qualified to enter the Siberian Cadets' corps, largely composed of sons and M. Svarvrud, secretary. of local men of affairs. Thanks again to his own efforts this indomitable Siberian pioneer character gained free training at the Michailovsk Artillery school, where his amazing mathematical faculties brought approval from the authorities, even though he was suspected, with reason, of being a secret revolutionary.

How to Send Mail to Men at Front

Designation of Division, Regiment, Company and Organization Must Be Given

Postmasters of Oregon are being urged by the war and postoffice departments to give as wide publicity as possible to the regulations governing the addressing of mail to soldiers of the American expeditionary forces now in France. Postmasters are informed that letters, post cards and printed matter originating in the United States and its possessions for transmission to the soldiers in Europe are subject to the United States doit through a tube in sanitary drinking mestic classification conditions and rates of postage.

Letters, postcards and printed matter originating with such forces for transmission to the United States are subject to the same classification except as modified by the provisions covering letters indorsed "Soldier's Letter," and contained in section 406, postal laws and regulations.

All mail addressed to members of the expeditionary forces should bear the complete designation of the division, regiment, company and organization to which the addressee belongs, as well as the name and address of the sender, and be fully prepaid by postage stamps. Patrons are forbidden to designate on the envelope the location of the unit.

Following is a sample of the correct manner in which to address a letter: "John Smith Jr., Company X, Infantry, American Expeditionary

The letter should bear the usual stamp, and on the upper left hand corner of the envelope must be written the name of the sender such as:

"Return to Mrs. John Smith. Blank street, Springfield, Ore.
