WHEN TO DO YOUR CANNING

The time to do the canning is within twenty-four hours of the time when fruits and vegetables are picked. The fresher they are when the canning process begins the surer they will be of keeping and the better they will taste when opened. Fruit should be picked before it is over-ripe, and vegetables while tender and young. Do not wait for the end of the season, but put up the new things as they come along. If you do not know how much better small beets are than large ones, find out this summer. Carrots two or three inches long seem like different vegetables when compared with course, woody, full-grown ones. Can them while they are small.

A jar or two, put up every day while one is getting dinner, seems to take no extra time. If one hurries a bit, or if one serenely plans to take advantage of the odd minutes while waiting for something else to cook, these little extras can be done without any trouble, while on the farm canning parties may be planned ahead when it is known that large amounts will be ready to can at a given time. —Woman's Home Companion.

CURBING THE WASTE

Just now the housewives of the country are being deluged with advice and warnings as to waste in kitchens. In many families the advice is superfluous, from the fact that prices and pocketbooks fail to harmonize. Economy was the first lesson learned by women when the present era of high prices opened. There is practically no waste in the average American home.

The waste and extravagance in this country is in the hotels, restaurants, cafes, etc., and in the mansions of the idle rich. Intelligent economy will never be practiced in these places as long as people persist in from six to ten course meals, of which only a small fraction is actually consumed the residue going either to "second hand" resorts or to the swill barrel. No system of food economy can be successful that permits waste of products for no other reason than that the waster has the price. —Hemet News.

tatives from the different auxiliaries who upon passing the examination return to their respective auxiliaries and then have full charge of the work done there. The Red Cross being a military organization and a part of the army all persons must do the work according to orders and instruc- tions.

To give some idea of what it costs to furnish the materials for the Red Cross supplies for the present urgent call for Lane county assignment of knitted articles of sweaters, socks, bed socks, etc., it will require over \$2200 to buy the yarn.

Many thousands of the best of Amer- ica's young manhood, among them many of our Springfield young men have responded to the call to arms. Many even now are enduring the hard- ships and dangers of the trenches on the fighting line in France. Some have lost their lives, some are in hos- pitals and thousands are in camp un- dergoing the severe training necessary to fit them for the future awaiting them at the front. Tee call for sur- gical dressings, hospital supplies and knitted articles, with which to furnish and care for our boys who are willing to give their lives for our protection, is so urgent and the assignment to the Lane county Red Cross chapter is so large that every lady should feel it a patriotic duty to respond to the call for volunteer workers and go to the classes held every Tuesday af- ternoon in the domestic art room in the Lincoln school building and do their bit.
