LAW PROVIDES MORE TIME

Fifteen Days Allowed for Filing of Objections to Assessments

A law enacted by the last legislature provides for 15 days in which objections to assessments may be filed instead of seven days as heretofore. The county board of equalization will meet September 10 and will remain in session for thirty days. Objections to assessments may be filed from September 10 to September 24, inclusive of both days. The county board of equalization consists of the county judge, the county clerk, and the county assessor.

CONSERVATION OF FOOD

Lane County Rural Scholars Will Learn Ways of Helping Hoover

Food conservation will be one of the subjects which will receive special attention in Lane county rural schools the coming year, according to F. L. Senter, county school supervisor. Copies of a pamphlet entitled "Ten Lessons in Food Conservation," prepared under the direction of Herbert C. Hoover, food administrator, have been received from P. P. Claxton, commissioner of the bureau of education of the United States agricultural department, and will be distributed to the teachers of Lane county to be used in connection with this work.
