During the conference of the Methodist church which will be held in Springfield the latter part of this month breakfast will be served to the visitors at the homes of citizens of Springfield but dinner and supper will be served to them in the church dining room. On Wednesday and Thursday, the first two days of the conference, the ladies of the Christian church will serve the dinner and supper and the Methodist ladies will serve on Friday, Saturday, and Sunday.
