And they are offering small, to grade their product carefully before sacking and shipping.

"The small potatoes of poor quality are not worth sacking and shipping," said Mr. Newell, "and when mixed with the better product they spoil the market and bring down the prices. Let the grower offer the smaller and inferior potatoes at a low price near the point of production, sell in quantity to the starch factories or canneries. or use them for stock feed. Do not mix them with the better quality and demoralize the whole potato market. Because there is not sufficient market in Oregon this year for her potato crop, approximately 4,000 cars, it is estimated, must be shipped to outside markets, and in order to find a ready sale and good price, the potatoes must be of good quality. Let every grower bear this in mind and hold himself responsible for the proper grading of his product before shipment."
