**Sugar Purchases Limited Now to \$1**

**New Rules Effective Immediately Also Prohibit All Special Sales.**

As a preventive of sugar hoarding, W. K. Newell, acting federal food administrator announced Friday the new regulations which affect not only families, but hotels and merchants. These rules are similar to those passed by food administrators in other Western states and are far less drastic than those in effect in the East, where the sugar shortage is much greater.

Following are the rules which are effective immediately throughout Oregon:

Sales to family consumers to be limited to \$1 purchases.

Sales to hotels, restaurants and boarding houses to be limited to 10 days' supply.

Farmers living at a distance from purchasing points will be permitted to purchase in 25-pound lots.

Sugar shall not be used as a leader for special sales or to encourage the sale of other merchandise.

All grocers are requested to report to the federal food administrator, 401 Northwestern Bank building, Portland, Oregon, the names and addresses of all persons attempting, through misrepresentation, to purchase in excess of the above limitations.
