Mammouth Cave Subject_of Talk

Epworth League Makes \$5.30 Which Will Be Applied on Church Pledge

Reverend E. C. Piollard, of Boston, gave a very interesting lecture on "The Wonders of the Mammoth Cave" at the Methodist church Tuesday evening under the auspices of the Epworth League. No admission was charged but a collection was taken up at the close of the meeting. This collection amounted to \$5.30 and will be applied on the Epworth League church memorial fund.

Mr. Pollard, who was at the head of a party of tourists when he visited this "greatest natural wonder in the world" had 24 oil paintings with which he illustrated his lecture.
