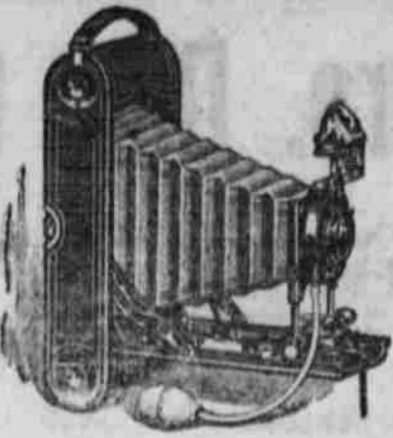


### Keep Your Kodak Busy
