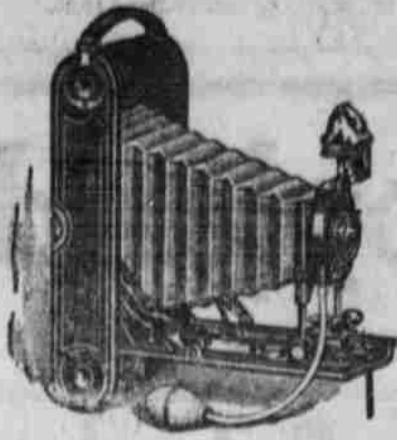


**Keep Your Kodak Busy**
