The Czar has always been under the influence of the Kaiser, he has always been surrounded by the Kaiser's men but, of course, the Czar thought himself superior.

"The whole thing was a conspiracy on the part of the kaiser and with his war machinery conquer woorld. There has been much discussion as to who rea' - caused the war and it has been laid by some to Teddy Roosevelt. "With all his stupidity and ignorance, the Kaiser demanded that Russia declare war on Germany and then sue for peace. Nicholas refused to do this unless Germany give him a bribe of \$100,000,000. Nicholas was forced to abdicate and a new form of government was established."

Professor Drucker then told how the old men, women and children were transported in wagons from the war and how most of them died of starvation. Then the government was put into the hands of three men. Germany however, could not control these men. The Kaiser then called into service a class of men whom he thoroughly despised but he wanted them for a purpose—they were the socialists.
