SENTENCED TO 60 DAYS

Foss C. Maple, Pleads Guilty to Charge of Embezzlement
Foss C. Maple, former postmaster of Marcola, was on Thursday sentenced to 60 days in the Multnomah county jail when he pleaded guilty to charges of embezzlement of \$290 of the post-office funds and the opening of a letter which passed through that office.

Leniency was extended to the prisoner on recommendation of the Federal attorneys. Though sentenced to serve 60 days on each of the counts alleged against him, it was decreed by the judge that the two terms are to run concurrently.

It was shown that Maple has a wife and four children under 12 years of age, who will be dependent on two of his brothers, both of whom are registered men, one in Class 1. Maple formerly conducted a drug store at Marcola, and explained that he took the \$290 from money order funds to help him meet personal debts, intending to repay the amount. He failed in business before repayment was effected, it was shown.
