THE PEOPLE ARE SAVING

It has been pointed out as evi-
dence of how strongly the duty
of saving had been impressed
upon the English people by the
war-savings campaign in that
country that in the year 1916,
although purchasing billions of
dollars of war bonds, the small
savings-bank depositors in Eng-
land increased their deposits
in savings banks over \$60,000,-
000, this in the face of the fact
that the English have been not-
ed as a spending rather than as
a saving people.

It seems that a similar pro-
cess has taken place in Amer-
ica. Two great Liberty Loans
were floated in the year just
closing, and nearly \$6,000,000,-
000 of Liberty Loan Bonds were
purchased by the people. Yet
instead of being depleted the
savings-banks deposits of the
country have been increased.
The president of one of the large
New York savings banks is quoted
as saying on December 20,
1917:

"One of the most remarkable
things about the Liberty Loan
campaigns is the small effect
they have had on the savings
banks accounts, which show an
increase. This we lay to the
appeals made to the American
people to purchase the bonds
out of their earnings, paying
for them from week to week or
from month to month. The peo-
ple appear to be doing as they
have been urged, purchasing the
bonds from current savings."
