Dies in Army

Deceased Was Half Brother of Mrs. Virgie Townsend of this City

Jesse Carl Williams, a half brother of Mrs. Virgie Townsend, of this city and of George Slaub of Creswell, died at Camp Kearney, California, December 31, of pneumonia, which followed an attack of the measles was buried January 4th at Butte City, California. He was past 28 years of age and enlisted in the federal service last August.

The following poem was written in memory of the boy by loving friends: "Not on the battlefield he fell Opposing those that hate and hell Have set 'gainst human liberty; Not on the firing line in France Where heroes fight to stop the advance Of Ruthlessness, did Jesse die.

And yet, his was a patriot's death; And he, as soldier, twined the wreath Duty, courage, service, love Fond memory places on the head Of citizen and soldier dead; Gone to his home above.
