He stands for business development and Office Phone 62; favors the comprehensive improvement and the construction of roads, particularly the main or trunk highways, which are of themselves military necessities, and believes that during the war this work should be prosecuted only with the consent and approval of the national government. He favors the construction of an adequate system of military highways for the defense of the Pacific coast and believes that the national government should undertake such construction immediately upon the termination of the war.
