A GROSS INJUSTICE

A gross injustice has been done Springfield in the report published in the Eugene and Portland papers that Springfield did not reach her quota in the Third Liberty Loan drive. Springfield's quota was \$32,000 and our subscriptions amounted to about \$45,000 making an over subscription of \$13,000. The county managers at Eugene failed to give this city credit for some \$16,000 subscribed by the employes of the Booth-Kelly Lumber company.

The managers knew perfectly well before that report was published that it was not in accordance with the facts in the case, their attention having been called to the matter by members of our committee.

Each community is entitled to credit for work done and Springfield is not asking for anything she is not entitled to but we do ask for a square deal. Our quota was raised within four days and it was so recognized in the fact that we were promptly awarded an honor flag.

All we ask of our brethren across the way is a square deal.

ACTIVITIES OF RED CROSS

Describing the American Red Cross as a body authorized to do everything possible for the comfort and welfare of the soldiers, and to make use of such agencies as are authorized and are in a position to contribute to that end in addition to the provisions made by the Government, a general statement by the War Department outlines certain approved activities:

To distribute sweaters, mufflers, helmets, socks, comfort kits etc.

To render emergency relief of every kind upon request of an officer in charge.

To relieve anxiety and sustain the morale of soldiers who are worried about their families at home, and to promote the comfort and well being of these families.

To conduct canteen service stations for furnishing refreshments to soldiers when traveling through the country; to furnish emergency relief to the sick and wounded when en route and to see that they are conveyed to a hospital when necessary and request ed by the commanding officer.

A representative of the Red Cross may be attached to each base hospital to furnish emergency supplies when called upon, to communicate with families of patients, to render home service to patients and such other assistance as pertains to Red Cross work.

EAT POTATOES AND HELP WIN THE WAR

To save food by eating food sounds like a conservation paradox. But at some seasons of the year there is an abundance of some one food or in some certain locality there is an enormous crop of some one thing. In such cases it is the national duty to eat as much as possible of this particular food and release its equivalent in other foods.

Such is the case right now with the potato, and the duty of honoring the potato in the consumption thereof is especially urgent because of the vital necessity of saving wheat to meet the overseas demands. EAT POTATOES AND SAVE WHEAT.

HELP WANTED! HOOVER NEEDS AID!

In order to make sure that there is sufficient sugar to meet the requirements of the 1918 canning season, the United States Food Administration is making a renewed appeal for greater conservation of sugar.

If you want to be sure of your favorite marmalade, quince jelly, or canned logan berries next winter, help Mr. Hoover save sugar for the housewives, who are relied upon to fill the pantry shelves with all these good things in the canning season. Arrangements have been made whereby every housewife, by signing an official certificate, will be able to secure an ample supply of sugar for canning and preserving fruits for her family upon assuring the government over her own signature, that the sugar will be used for this purpose only and that she will limit her household in the use of sugar for all other purposes to three pounds per person per month.

Now in order to provide this supply of sugar for the home canners, Mr. Hoover calls upon us all to do a little extra saving on sweets. By using less sugar in your tea or coffee and eliminating all frosting or sweetened fillings in cakes and by eating less candy or no candy at all everybody can help save sugar for the canners. Instead of sugar use cane, corn and maple syrups, honey or molasses in cooking. To sweeten your cereals serve them with syrup or sweet fruits and most important of all stay your hand when it reaches for the sugar-bowl! That extra spoonful sprinkled over your strawberries or ladled into your coffee may seem only a little bit, but with everybody doing it, the spoonfuls soon mount up to sacks.

McNary Opposed to Withdrawal Idea

Oregon Senator Telegraphs People Should Have Free Hand in Selecting Candidate

United States Senator McNary, in a telegram received at the McNary headquarters at Portland last Thursday, stated that he was not in sympathy with ex-Governor West's recent proposal that the ex-Governor, R. N. Stanfield and Judge King, retire from the Senatorial field and leave it clear to the Senator. Senator McNary gave as his reasons that the people are entitled "to have a free hand in the selection of their Senator" and that he desires no candidate to make "a political or personal sacrifice" for him.

Senator McNary further declared that he had submitted his candidacy "to the voters without reference to any other person's ambition," and that what any of his opponents in either party did or might do was entirely "upon their initiative."

In declining to accept ex-Governor West's proposal Mr. Stanfield, candidate against Senator McNary, and Judge King, candidate against Mr. West, commented upon the proposal at length, and the McNary headquarters here telegraphed the Senator for his views upon it. His message was in response to this wire, and reads as follows:

"Telegraphic advice having reached me relative to ex-Governor West's proposal that he and Messrs. Stanfield and King all withdraw from the primary contest, I desire to say that Mr. West's proposal came to me as a complete surprise. Being a candidate, I am not made the confidant of my opponents for the Senatorship in either party. What they do or may not do is entirely upon their initiative and not through any understanding with me. I have submitted my candidacy to the voters without reference to any other person's ambition and free from any notion or purpose that anyone should retire in my favor or make a political or personal sacrifice for me. Such a proposal does not command my sympathy, as I desire the voters to have a free hand in the selection of their Senator."
