### OUR NATIONAL PROBLEM

Our problem, says the Federal Reserve Board, is to convert less essential into more essential credit and to convert less essential into more essential production and distribution of goods. The saving of credit and money goes hand in hand with the saving of labor and materials in the program of adjusting the business of the Nation to a war basis. Our best hope of avoiding competition between the Government and its citizens for credit, money, labor, and materials, which can only result in credit and price inflation and higher costs of living is saving.

### WHEN PEACE COMES

Some day peace will come. Thousands—millions of men—will suddenly be thrown back again into civil life. Consider the vastness of the readjustment that will be necessary. Look back at the period of reconstruction after our own Civil War. Prepare for this new period of reconstruction. The day of reckoning is bound to come. Begin to save now. Thrift is the need of the present, the hope of the future. Liberty Loan Bonds, War Savings, the safest securities in the world, are a wise provision for the day peace comes.

### THE ECONOMY OF VICTORY

No matter what this war costs the Government and the people of the United States in the way of money, it is going to be much cheaper to win this war than to lose it.

The commercial and financial losses that would follow a German victory are not to be calculated. All that we spent would be lost, indemnities beyond calculation would have to be paid and along with those losses would come a continuing loss in foreign commerce that would spell disaster.

With these material losses we would lose our national liberty and independence, our power to secure our international rights, our right to live in a world ruled by the dictates of humanity and civilization.

Work in C. F. Eggiman Store Is Done by H. E. Pitts

within the sound of my voice who would not go out and fight to protect the sanctity of the home.

"My mission and your mission dear friends, is to do something for the fellow who is down and out, to protect the girl who has fallen, to reach out to the wayward girl and lift her up. This country has a mission. I come to a place where there is no language to express the motive of this nation. All along the great highways the great beacon lights, lights that beam out to the mariner show the great shoals and rocks in order that our ships may be safely brought in.

"This great republic has undertaken a mission of bringing trodden men and women into the fold of freedom. We are in the greatest holocaust this world has ever known and to-day I say to you fathers and mothers who have boys across the sea, except for the sacrifice of our American citizens this war would not be worth gaining but the sacrifices we are making will make an indelible impression upon us for it is all for the cause of humanity and to make the world safe for men and women.

"I am thinking that this awful war will be won but it cannot be won without the greatest sacrifice the world has ever known. Unless America will come to the front and give all it has I say the principles of liberty is lost, but the hand of God is directing this great cause. Unless the one great hand continues to guide our destiny, the hand that gives fragrance to the blossoms, that gives life to every power upon the earth our cause is lost, I say unless this hand will guide and direct us until victory is assured."

The high school trio composed of Dorothy Holbrook, Iva Hill and Gladys Lepley accompanied by Marion Richmond sang a selection after which Professor R. L. Kirk gave a talk setting before the people the cause, effects and explaining the great days of the Civil War, leading up to the Gettysburg address by Lincoln and then reading the address.

The people then went to the mill-race where flowers were scattered on the water to pay tribute to those brave men who met a watery grave for their country and its freedom. A large number of automobiles went to the Laurel Hill cemetery in the forenoon to decorate the graves of the dear ones who have gone, and especially those of the soldier dead. Flags were also placed on the graves of the latter.
