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### FRUIT SLUGS NUMEROUS CIRCUS GIVEN LAST

Fruit Inspector Says to Spray at Once

C. E. Stewart, county fruit inspector, cautions the farmers and fruit growers to spray their cherry trees as soon as the fruit is gathered and the pear trees at once, on account of the slugs, the first brood of which is working on the leaves now.

The fruit inspector says that the first brood is seven or eight times as numerous as usual, which indicates that the second brood will be greater than usual. It is the second brood that does damage and unless the trees are sprayed at once the second brood will be beyond control. The slugs if allowed to remain will strip the trees of leaves and leave the young buds unprotected.

The proper spray for slugs is one pound of the dry powder arsenate or two pounds of the paste preparation to 50 gallons of water.
