Eugene—Contract let for construction of \$10,000 unit of Eugene Fruit Grower's Association.

Astoria—Novel bridge erected across John Day river few miles east of here costing \$25,000.

Gresham—New garage erected for Standard Oil company.

U. S. PASSPORT BAN IS TO BE RELAXED

Secretary Lansing has announced that restrictions of passports to Europe are to be relaxed immediately.

Passports will now be issued to all countries except enemy countries and Russia, when applicants can show the object of their visit is legitimate and reasonable. Beginning November 1, passports will be issued to persons wishing to visit Europe for pleasure purposes.

EVERY STATE IN THE UNION GOT A FEW

In the month of June the Bureau of War Risk Insurance sent out 32,322 checks aggregating \$30,832,726, to soldiers and their dependents for allotment and allowance and compensation and insurance benefits under the War Risk Insurance Act. These checks went to all the states in the Union and some to foreign countries.
