BOY WITH WHEEL SEVERELY INJURES WOMAN

At about nine o'clock on the night of September 1, while riding his wheel without a light on the sidewalk on Fifth street, Alonzo Manwearing, a nine-year-old boy, ran into and severely injured Mrs. L. G. Lansbery. The lady had several teeth knocked out and others loosened, her jaw fractured and knees and ankles badly bruised. She was assisted to her home in the north part of town by her little boy, who was with her at the time, and by neighbors, and a physician was called to attend to her injuries.

The Manwearing boy was arrested on complaint of Mrs. Lansbery charged with riding on the sidewalk in violation of city ordinance. On trial in police court last Saturday, he pleaded guilty. The father, as responsible for his little son's infraction of the law, was fined five dollars and costs. The boy, after being severely reprimanded by Judge Edwards, promised to be careful in the future.

Will Follow Federal Duck Season

The federal seasons for duck shooting will be followed by the state game authorities according to an announcement made by Carl D. Shoemaker, state game warden. For all of Western Oregon, or Game District No. 1, which takes in all the counties west of the summit of the Cascade mountains, the season opens on October 1st and closes on January 15th, both days inclusive. For Eastern Oregon, or Game District No. 2, the season opens on September 16th and closes on December 31st, both days inclusive. The courts have uniformly held that the federal law is supreme and if seasons are to be changed they must come through the federal government and not the state. Sportsmen throughout Oregon will, therefore, observe the federal laws and seasons with reference to the shooting of ducks. However, all other provisions of the state law, with the exception of the opening and closing dates, will be enforced, as there is no conflict with reference to bag limits, hours for shooting and methods of pursuit. The bag limit for migratory birds is twenty-five in any one day and not to exceed thirty in any seven consecutive days.

LAW VIOLATED BY FRUIT VENDORS

The Oregon Statesman reports that in Salem and some other Willamette valley towns the state law intended to prohibit the selling of peaches, apples and similar commodities by the bushel is being violated, and warning to growers and vendors to desist from the practice has been issued by W. A. Dalziel, state sealer of weights and measures.

"The law clearly states that all commodities shall be sold by net weight or numerical count," said Mr. Dalziel. "Upon investigation it is found that in Salem and some other Willamette valley towns peaches are being sold by the bushel or at least in boxes that are supposed to contain a bushel, but in many cases the boxes are not filled. The law regulates the sale of apples by creating a standard box of certain dimensions, and apples placed in these boxes should be packed and not thrown in loosely, which now seems to be the prevailing custom. It is not the desire of this department to cause the honest farmer or business man any inconvenience or extra expense in marketing these commodities, but the time has come when the 'shortweight artist,' be he farmer, merchant, or vendor, must cease operations in this state."
