RETURNS FROM EASTERN TRIP

W. F. Walker, a local undertaker, who is a past grand master of the Grand lodge, I. O. O. F., of the state of Oregon, and its grand representative to the Sovereign Grand lodge, has just returned from the meeting of the Sovereign Grand lodge session which was held in Baltimore, Md., in September. Representatives who attended many previous sessions pronounced this session to be the best in the history of the Sovereign Grand lodge.

The city of Baltimore was the birthplace of American Odd Fellowship, it having been instituted in this city on April 26, 1818, and the session just closed marking the one hundredth year of its history, was known as the centennial celebration session. One of the big public features of the session was the parade, which took over two hours to pass a given point. In this parade was to be seen a great number of the Patriarch Militant, or Canton, who with their fine uniforms, swords and banners, presented a splendid military appearance. Hundreds of floats and 49 brass bands, with many other things too numerous to mention, made up what was said to have been the most spectacular pageant, which had ever passed over the streets of the city of Baltimore.

Walker on the eastern trip and together they visited many places of interest, among them being Chicago, Washington, D. C., Philadelphia, New York, Buffalo and some Canadian cities. Many inquiries in regard to the west were made and many people were found who are much interested in the western section of the United States. All such questions were answered in the best possible way.

The next session of the Sovereign Grand lodge will be held in Boston, Mass., in 1920, celebrating the landing of the Pilgrims. Mr. Walker is also a delegate to this session.
