their establishment and maintenance and for the raising and distribution of funds.

"Resolved, that it is the sense of this institute that the teachers of this state are underpaid, and that so long as the present high cost of living prevails, the minimum salary now

provided by law should be raised to not less than \$100 per month, with a reasonable differential in favor of those having adequate professional training and successful teaching experience.

"Realizing the harmful effects of the cigarette habit upon the youth of our land and the great difficulty of enforcing our present laws upon the subject for regulating their sale and use, we most heartily endorse the proposed initiative measure absolutely prohibiting the manufacture and sale of cigarettes.

"Resolved, that the present salary of the county school superintendent of Lane county is entirely too low and recommend that the next legislature be asked to raise the same to not less than \$2000 dollars per annum.
