**SALE OF TIMBER ON THE SANTIAM NATIONAL FOREST**

Seventy million feet of timber on the Breitenbush river within the Santiam national forest has just been put up for sale by the district forester. This is the largest tract of national forest timber to be put on the market for several months in this district of the forest service.

The timber lies on both sides of the Breitenbush river a short distance above Detroit, Oregon, largely within drainage of two small creeks known as Canyon and Hansen creeks. The tract contains sixty million feet of Douglas fir of medium size and fair quality, and about nine million feet of sugar and western white pines, noble fir, western red cedar, hemlock and silver fir.

Since the Breitenbush river is a favorite resort for fishermen and vaca-

tionists, the contract for the sale of the timber will contain special stipulations to prevent the logging operations from marring the natural beauty of the banks of the stream or destroying all the splendid virgin forest which the scenic road sometime to be built up the north bank of the river will traverse.

**START CAMPAIGN TO RAISE \$30,000 FOR WOMEN'S BUILDING**

To raise the last \$30,000 necessary to finish the \$200,000 building for women on the University of Oregon campus, Miss Florence Fursuet of Eugene has been appointed by the student council of the university to have charge of the work. The state has been divided into seven districts and students of the university will carry on the entire campaign. The district covering Lane county is in charge of Miss Marjorie Kay of Salem.

The women's building will house the women's gymnasium, the department of household arts and others of the women's activities on the campus.

With its enrollment almost doubled since its last new building was completed, the university finds its buildings entirely inadequate to handle the students already there, to say nothing of the large increase certain for next fall. The students, aroused to the emergency, have called their "Oregon Spirit" to the rescue and have organized the present campaign in which they feel confident of success. The committee consists of 150 members.

**SHIPYARD STRIKERS OWN \$7,200,000 U. S. SECURITIES**

**Liberty Bonds and War Savings Stamps Help Support Idle Workers**

One of the reasons the striking shipyard workers in seven plants around San Francisco bay have been able to hold out for their demand of eight cents an hour increase is that collectively they own more than \$7,000,000 worth of Liberty Bonds and about \$200,000 in War Savings Stamps. "The Liberty Bond and War Savings Stamps holdings of our men have certainly stood us in good stead," said Frank Miller, secretary of the San Francisco Iron Trades Council. "When we win our demand I am going to recommend that the men save that eight cent an hour increase and invest it weekly with the Government in War Savings Stamps. They provide an ideal way for the workman to save."

C. A. Farnsworth, associate director of the War Loan Organization for the Twelfth Federal Reserve District, said: "Secretary Miller's figures on the Liberty Bond holdings and their investment in War Savings are conservative and there is no doubt that they have aided greatly in enabling the men to support themselves while on strike. The men can borrow the face value of their Liberty Bonds without sacrificing the bonds and they can cash in their War Savings Stamps."

The Government's War Savings Stamp is the working man's weapon against a hand-to-mouth existence. It helps him get ahead.
