LOCAL BANK IS SUED FOR \$25,000 DAMAGES

In a suit recently filed in the federal court in Portland by S. V. Cagley, formerly of Springfield, the First National bank and Charles L. Scott are made defendants. Cagley seeks \$25,000 damages on account of his arrest in Portland last September on a charge of larceny and embezzlement of funds of the Springfield lodge of Odd Fellows. After being held in jail a few days his case was dismissed on a motion of the district attorney at Eugene.

Cagley alleges in his complaint that he gave the lodge of Odd Fellows a check for \$70 on the First National bank of Springfield to cover his alleged shortage and that the check was returned to the payee marked "no funds." Cagley says he then sent to the bank from Portland a money order for \$80, according to his statement. Instead of applying it to his checking account, he alleges Scott and the bank applied it on a note, not yet due.
