

SUGGESTIONS FOR STORING YOUR POTATOES IN WINTER

The following suggestions for successful storing of potatoes have been sent out from the United States Department of Agriculture.

The tubers must be protected from extremes of cold and heat. A temperature ranging from 25 degrees to 40 degrees F. is considered satisfactory. Sufficient ventilation must be provided to remove foul air and excess molstane.

The storage house must be so constructed as to make it possible to exclude the light, as the table quality of potatoes quickly determinates in the light.

The tubers should be dry and reasomably free from diri when put into storage. An excess of moisture or of soil increases the amount of heat generated in a newly stered pile of potatoes. The soil fends to close up the spaces between the lubers, thus cutting off air circulation and indping to retain hear that would otherwise useape.


