SUGGESTIONS FOR STORING YOUR POTATOES IN WINTER

The following suggestions for successful storing of potatoes have been sent out from the United States Department of Agriculture:

The tubers must be protected from extremes of cold and heat. A temperature ranging from 35 degrees to 40 degrees F. is considered satisfactory.

Sufficient ventilation must be provided to remove foul air and excess moisture.

The storage house must be so constructed as to make it possible to exclude the light, as the table quality of potatoes quickly deteriorates in the light.

The tubers should be dry and reasonably free from dirt when put into storage. An excess of moisture or of soil increases the amount of heat generated in a newly stored pile of potatoes. The soil tends to close up the spaces between the tubers, thus cutting off air circulation and helping to retain heat that would otherwise escape.

All diseased, badly cut, or bruised tubers should be removed from the crop before putting it into storage.

It is not advisable to store potatoes at a greater depth than 5 to 6 feet, and the floor dimensions of the bin should not be greater than 12 by 12 feet unless provided with a series of ventilating shafts for the escape of moisture and heat. Ventilated division walls and floors are also desirable.

Full information on this and many other points in connection with potatoes is contained in Farmers' Bulletin 1064.

CHOCOLATE CAKE.

An inexpensive chocolate cake may be made from the following recipe: One cup sugar, 2 squares or ounces of chocolate shortening size of an egg, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1 egg, 1 cup sour milk, 1 teaspoon soda, 1 3/4 cups flour, melt the chocolate in bowl over teakettle, when melted add the shortening, then the sugar and cream them well, beat with egg beater in another bowl the egg, salt and sour milk; combine the two mixtures sift in the flour and soda and mix well; add vanilla and bake.

MARRIAGES OUTNUMBER DIVORCES LAST YEAR

A total of 211 marriages licenses were issued by Lake county during the year 1919 according to a report from County Clerk R. S. Byson. Divorce decrees numbered 108 in 1919. There were 110 suits and motions of all kinds filed in the circuit court during the year. 22 criminal indictments were returned, 111 transcripts from justice court were filed, 31 jury trials were held and 15 suits were tried before the judge without juries.
