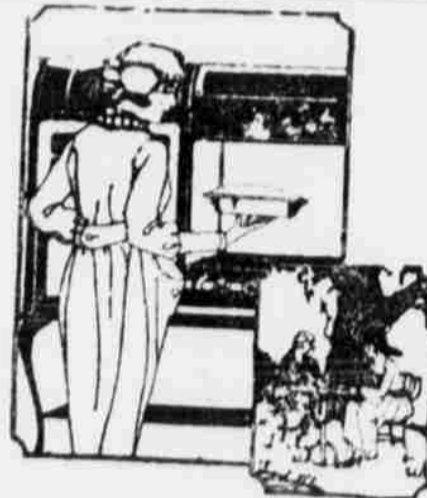
THE HELPING HAND.

The West Coast Lumbermen's association is making a special effort to furnish employment for ex-service men and each member of this lumbermen's organization is being sent a pledge card which reads:

In recognition of our obligation to former service men, and in order that such men shall not pass the winter unemployed, our company agrees to give employment to former service men, over and above those now employed in our operations, to at least five per cent of the total number of all our employees; the number thus pledged, or an equivalent number, to be continued in our employ, barring enforced close downs, for a period of ninety days.
