Sift together 1 cup of white flour, 4 cup of sugar, 1.2 teaspoon of soda, 1 1-2 teaspoons of baking powder and 1-4 teaspoon of salt. Add 1 1-2 cups of Graham flour and 1 cup of seedless raisins. Mix 1 cup of sour milk with 1.3 cup of molasses and stir into the dry ingredients. Bake in a greased loaf pan 45 minutes. This is an excellent bread to serve with Baked Beans

TOMATO BISQUE

If a hot soup is desired to be quickly served the following is one which can be made in a very few minutes.

Prepare 2 cups of thin, well-sea soned cream sauce. Heat 1 can can of Tomato Sauco, add a pinch of soda -1-16 teaspoon-and pour it into the hot cream sauce, sticring constantly, Serve at once with crisp crackers.

OYSTERS VENETIA

Heat 1 quart of oysters to the boiling point in their own liquor Remove the oysters and keep in a hot place. Melt 3 tablespoons of fat, add 4 tablespoons of flour. 14 tempoon each of salt and pepper, and the liquid from the oysters with milk enough to make 1 1-2 cups. Stir till it boils and pour onto a beaten egg and 1 teaspoon of lemon juice. Cook without boiling for 2 minutes. Spread a layer of hot chopped spinach in a serving dish and on this place the centers.
