BROCCOLI MAY MATURE.

Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis, Jan. 28.—Oregon broccoli will mature normally provided the mild weather continues, in the opinion of A. G. Bouquet, professor of vegetable gardening at the college. Should another cold snap materialize, however, it is doubtful if much can be done to save the crop, he believes. The chief injury done by the December cold snap was to break off and generally damage the large leaves.

Specimen plants from the growers of Douglas county show complete freezing of the large veins in the leaves but this may not materially devitalize the plant.

The question raised by the broccoli

growers throughout the state are whether or not the plants will make a crop, since the miniature heads are practically unprotected by the large leaves, also whether there will be enough of the jacket left to protect the broccoli from damage while en route to the east.

Broccoli is rapidly coming to the front as an eastern seller and a shortage would mean a great loss to the Oregon growers.
