BROCCOLI MAY MATURE.

Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis, Jan. 28.—Oregon broccoli will mature normaly provided the mild weather continues, in the opinion of A. G. Bouquet, professor of vegetable gardening at the college. Should another cold snap materialize, however, it is doubtful if much can be done to save the crop, he believes. The chief injury done by the December cold snap was to break off and Albany-Iron works to enlarge generally damage the large leaves.
