Bellevue Springs—Twenty room hotel to be built on Lost Creek park.

Klamath Falls—Spreckels interests have purchased 30,000 Wood ranch on Upper Klamath lake to grow sugar beets and will build refinery.

Ten new business houses have opened in Ashland during the past three months.

Roseburg installs new pumps to remedy water shortage.

Grants Pass gets factory for manufacture of fertilizer, dye stuffs and sprays.

Salem—Mangis brothers fruit and vegetable dealers, to build \$25,000 block.

Cottage Grove manufacturing company enlarging plant.

Marshfield—Hans complete for a \$50,000 box factory.

With favorable weather conditions, a plentiful supply of labor and a continued demand for their product, the lumber mills of western Oregon and western Washington are running on what approximates a capacity basis.

The output at 133 mills reporting to the West Coast Lumbermen's association last week was \$5,370,474, four or only 4.94 per cent below normal. The only unfavorable element in the lumber situation is the continued shortage of cars.

Klamath Falls—Klamath River Lumber company incorporated for \$100,000.

Medford—Excitement is developed south of Siskiyou over oil prospects. California Oil Development company planning to sink four wells and spend \$250,000 in exploring field.

Engeno—Sawmill and bearing camp at Westlake obliged to shut down account car shortage.
