COUNTY CONFERENCE TO BE HELD IN APRIL

**Interchurch World Movement
to Send Big "Team"
Here.**

TO SHOW RESULTS OF SURVEYS

All Local Protestant Churches Co-operating in Movement Will Be Represented.

Early in April the Interchurch World Movement will hold its conference in this county. Representatives are now being selected by the local Protestant Churches of denominations associated with the movement, and soon present reports on attendance at the conference will number well over two hundred. In addition to the representatives selected by the churches, the conference will be open to all church members and friendly citizens who wish to attend.

The meetings place probably will be the county seat, and the attendance will be composed of the members of the Protestant churches of the county.

The conferences will last one day only. During that day will be presented the whole program of the Interchurch World Movement, or promoting cooperation in missionary and general church activities among the Protestant churches. Time will also be given to discussion of the local problems revealed by the Interchurch Movement's survey of religious conditions throughout the United States.

This county conference will be just one of the 2000 odd to be held throughout the United States on approximately the same dates.

No Sidestepping of Problems.

It will be, it is said, a very exceptional county that does not hear some more or less unpalatable truths concerning unchurched areas, or wasteful competition, or underpaid and absent preachers. No many counties, it is stated, are able to show an average ministerial salary higher than the average for the whole United States, which is \$937, while barely one third

of the census population of the United States, according to estimates made by the Interchurch survey, has an opportunity for regular church attendance.

Besides a full consideration of local problems, the program at the county conference will present the outstanding results of the world wide series of religious, social and economic conditions made by the Interchurch Movement, the material for which has been gathered from every corner of the earth. Special emphasis will also be laid on the place of prayer in Christian life, the importance of assisting young people in the right choice of their life-work and the duty of laying aside a definite proportion of income for religious purposes. Lantern slides will be freely used to illustrate the various offshoots.

Big Educational Campaign Prepared.

This series of conferences represents only an intermediate stage in a great campaign of intensive education in practical Christianity preparatory to the united effort for missionary funds and workers which will be held by the Protestant denominations cooperating in the Interchurch Movement between April 26 and May 2. The members of the team that will address the county conference were themselves trained as a "faculty" of specialists in the various aspects of the Movement at a series of state and pastors' conferences. Similarly, those who attend the county conference will in turn form a "faculty" for interpreting the message of the Interchurch Movement to their local churches.

Thus it is expected that before April 20 the ideal of church cooperation advocated by the Interchurch World Movement, in place of church competition, and the program of evangelization that goes with it, will be familiar to every one of the fifty million Protestants in the United States.

ROAD BONDS DISCUSSED

levy and then wait several years for the completion of the several projects? It is true that under the bond program the bonds draw 5 per cent interest. Isn't tax money as it would be paid under direct tax worth at least 5 per cent if it should remain in the hands of the taxpayer? Most people can make their tax money, should they keep it, earn them over 5 per cent and those that borrow money with which to pay their taxes will have to pay 7 or 8 per cent for the money. If roads are not worth 5 per cent as an investment we are making a mistake in building roads at any time and in any place.

Benefits Should Be Distributed.

I hold that those receiving the benefits of the road program expenditure should share in paying for the same. Under the direct tax method the taxpayer present while roads are under construction pays the entire cost of the completed road system under the bond program, the future tax payer, the man here from 12 to 25 years hence helps pay his proportionate part for benefits received previous derived.

Better roads will mean better market for the farmer, better market facilities will give the incentive for putting more men in a better state of culture in thereby helping more money into the court for farm products and increasing the wealth of the nation. This increased wealth of the nation will help pay off the bonds paid for road construction, among others. Those receiving the benefit of the roads when built will help pay off the bonds as they receive due by competing agriculture departments in enlisting districts those roads will in a sense create a fund of wealth out of which any payments of interest and principal sum will be taken care of. This is the same principle which underlies the levy of special assessments on property enhanced in value by paving or improving a city street.

The tillable and productive acres at present on good highways are paying more taxes than they would be if only productive acres had access to good roads. This would continue under the direct tax method while under the bond plan the remote areas would increase in value when the roads were completed and this increased valuation would help pay off the bonds. One great cause of high taxes is our fertile acres that are not producing on account of the lack of transportation facilities. The 300 miles of road as outlined in the bond bill should increase the valuation of Lane County when completed at \$100,000,000, one can easily figure what this would mean in lowering present taxes. In other words, taxes down by increasing property taxes and the earning power of land.

The citizens of Lane County want and will beyond a doubt have better roads—either by the direct tax method or the bonding method. I believe that under the bond program necessary roads will be built and open for traffic before they could be provided under any alternative plan and that it likewise offers the best method of paying for the same and therefore offers the best solution of the road problem for the taxpayers of Lane County.

RECORD BOOK FOR FARMERS

Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis, March 16.—To help the farmers of Lane County put their farms on a business basis the college has prepared a farm record book which has been distributed through the banks of the county to more than 550 of these have been distributed through the banks in Lane County to date. The county agents of the counties help the farmers to begin the records and also assist them to balance them at the end of the year.

Teachers of agriculture in the high schools of the state who are working under the Smith Hughes vocational education act are using these in connection with their project work. The high school student keeps records of his pig or acre of corn or whatever he is doing for his home project work and these records form the basis of farm management studies in the class room.
