BERRY INDUSTRY IN OREGON.

Western Oregon has before it the opportunity to become world famous for its berry crops, just as California is known the world over for its oranges, lemons and raisins.

The berry industry has a good start. The pioneering has been done. Loganberries, strawberries, raspberries, and all varieties of blackberries grow to perfection here. It has been demonstrated that this climate and soil is excellently adapted to these crops. Now remains the campaign to increase the acreage and increased production per acre. More and more farmers are realizing the value and advantages of these crops and are planting their acreage to berries. More land is being cleared each year and planted to berries and other small fruits. This will mean thousands of new homes on small farms. And this will result in many new canning and preserving factories which will ship their products as far and as wide as the California oranges and raisins.

The manufacturing end of the fruit industry has made the market and established a profitable price for the grower. The grower and the manufacturer must cooperate to obtain the best results. Each needs the other. The home market that is nearest to the place where the raw material is produced is the best market for perishable products.

It remains for the farmers to furnish the raw material. A cannery or

some suitable market is sure to follow. And this will mean prosperity for all.

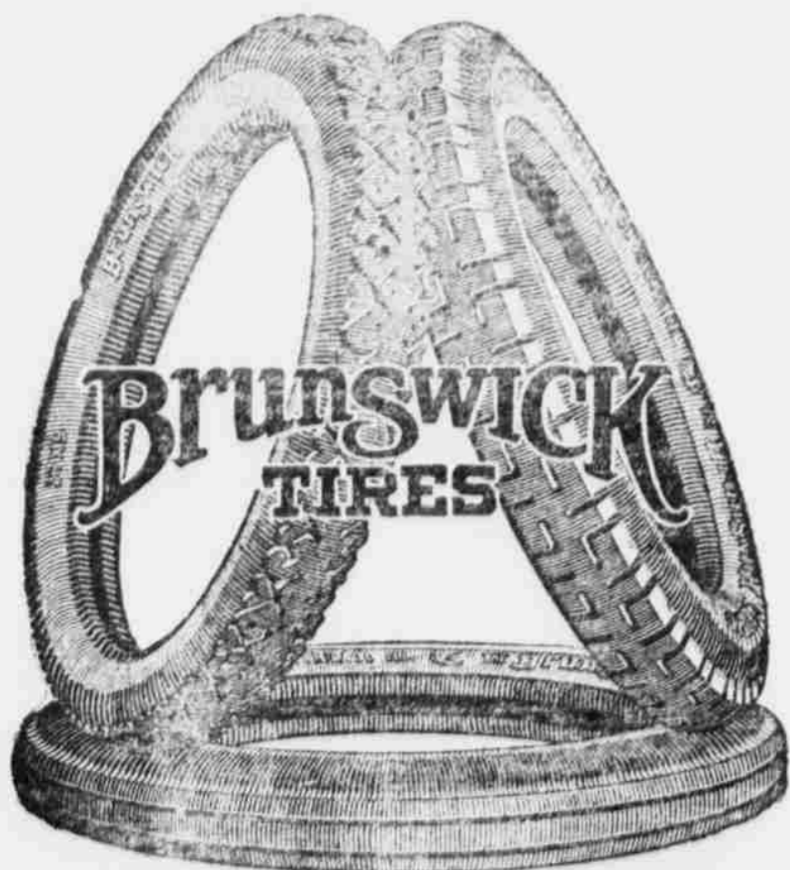
