as recommended by our agricultural colleges. Wonderful information can be obtained at little expense, and great future values opened up to every farmer.

Humus, vegetable-mould, when fresh, is the life of the soil so long as it has the power of nutrition to develop minute fungus which gathers and holds nitrogen that has been liberated by cultivation. Humus also holds soil moisture. In the chapter, **Home Fertilizer**, is revealed how to rapidly develop humus, namely chemically decomposing straw and barnyard manure, also using the same chemicals, and sow on the green sodding, while the dew is on. Strap-leaf turnips sown in the fall will blossom early in spring in time for late potatoes. Land-plaster or gypsum and two other chemicals, which are as cheap as gypsum, iron on turnips, vetch, field peas, clover, weeds and ploughed under, quickly decomposes them; and this vegetable mould rapidly develops bacteria, a fungus growth which in turn gathers nitrogen, the most needed of all the soil fertilizers, which insures a crop. All will wish to know what causes wheat, rye, oats, barley, etc., to stalk; that is, many stalks to develop from one seed. As this knowledge can not be told in one paragraph, or one brief chapter, which, in many instances has doubled and trebled grain crops, we must ask you to carefully read the coming chapters, especially the one on **Home Made Fertilizer**.

One of the things I have taken into careful consideration in practical farm life is soil-evaporation. I wish



Salt is good to arrest soddening. You have observed this, and might reply, "salt kills vegetation." Salt is a poison and will kill animal life also in moderate quantities. Salt united with gypsum in humus arrests soddening and holds it for plant life.

The inventor of the **Pathfinder Gate** bought a farm in Michigan that had "shoulder gates," old slide gates made of oak boards 16 feet in length, that neither woman nor child could scarcely open. Is your farm in such a condition, slide gates, sagging hinges, which compel you to get out of your auto or wagon, in your "Sunday tags," and wade through dust or mud to open and shut?

Then turn your gates, by using old ones if you desire, into one of the most practical and easily opened gate in the world; a child has strength enough to open and close it; opens almost as easily as though pivoted.

To renew the old gate, nail or bolt on one end of the gate 4 one inch thick, 4x8 of 6x19 inch boards; A A B B opposite each other. In the cut one is shown to be above the other, so it can be the more easily seen and understood. Nail onto the gate post a scantling, C, a 2x4, 3 feet in length, made wedge shape; over this wedge nail a board, D, the same length of the wedge. This board prevents the gate from being thrown from its hinges, even if stuck get behind it, crowding it severely. The gate is hung by wire and chain, making a perfect hinge. The artist pictured a clevis, but this is not necessary; make the boards a little longer and bolt the chain between, and a strike will hold the chain to the gate post; the Wire and Chain Making a Perfect Hinge, and permits the gate to open and close with little or no friction.
