### WHAT THE FARMER WANTS.

Your things are required of a good farmer: ability to make a full and comfortable living from the land; to rear a family carefully and well; to be of service in building up not only his community, but the county and state, leaving all a legacy by better and more productive farming. Back-to-the-land and stay-on-the-land—a good deal has been accomplished in this direction in the past few years. The study of the story, **The Possibilities of a Pentap Garden**, is a step of the ladder by which the farmer climbs to the summit; as soon as a step has been advanced he adapts it to his own farm as to soil. The delight in farming rises and improves in proportion to the application which he bestows upon it. Thus

what was first a mystery becomes a length of enlightenment. As the land is improved by planting various seeds, clover, vetch, peas, wheat and its kind, so is the studious mind improved by a practical study of the tilling of the soil, won by observation. There is no study that is not capable of delighting us after a little application to it. There is an unspeakable pleasure in telling our own enlight-ened observation to the children, and the children educate us. ### INVESTING FOR PROFIT

How to spend the week—I joined a few friends on their way to spend a half day fishing. They were from the city and did not know where to find worms. They lay this task to me. I went to a nearby dairy, and was informed to dig for them under a pear tree nearby. As I lifted a shovel of dirt I was so surprised that I called the farmer and showed him my discovery, a shovelful of worms. I asked him if he knew how this happened, and he said "pear leaves and milky water." I asked why pear leaves, and he pointed to both apple, cherry and peach trees and said, "I have seen the wash water of the dairy under these trees, like I have done under this pear tree and found fewer worms." He made no further use of his knowledge. He is for it was a valuable discovery to quickly enrich the soil. Value decomposed straw, manure and urine-water as you should and quickly enrich your depleted farm. While milky wash water is not possible to give the farm property decomposed manure and urine are the better for Home Made Fertilizer.
