

## LOGANBERY GROWER MUST PLAN FOR FUTURE MARKET

It is in the loganberry business he is seriously interested in establishing a healthy marketing condition for the berries during future years.

The loganberry is on trial and if it can keep up a healthy development of the consumption of this berry during the next five years as has been the case during the past two years, the grower will then be in a position to market all of the berries produced in Oregon and Washington, but if he stands too high for too great a profit this year, it may result in the abandonment of the berry, which is such a danger to the berry grower in the future as it is to the consumer.

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
