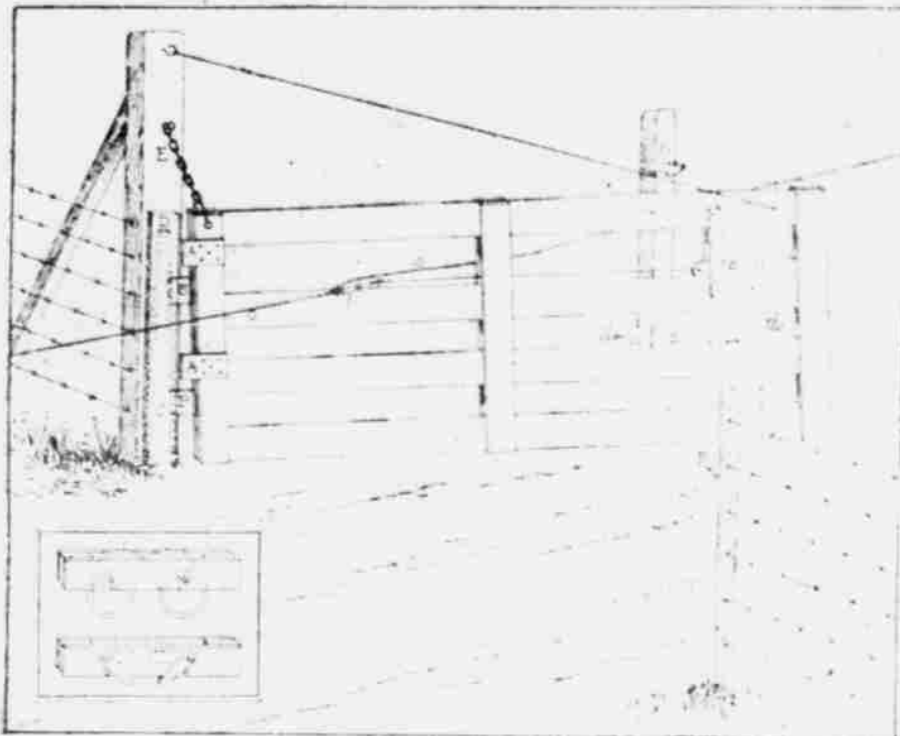

The inventor of the **Pathfinder Gate** bought a farm in Michigan that had "slide gates," old slide gates made of oak boards 16 feet in length that neither woman or child could scarcely open in your farm in such a condition, slide gates sagging hinges, which compelled you to get out of your auto or wagon in your "Sunday togs" and wade through dust or mud to open and shut.

Then turn your gates, by using old ones if you desire, into one of the most practical and easily opened gate in the world; a child has strength enough to open and close it; opens almost as easily as though pivoted.

To renew the old gate, nail or bolt on one end of the gate 4 one inch thick, 4x8 or 6x10 inch boards. A A B B opposite each other. In the cut one is shown to be above the other, as it can be the more easily seen and understood. Nail onto the gate post a scantling C, a 2x4, a foot in length, made wedge shape, over this wedge nail a board D, the same length of the wedge. This board prevents the gate from being thrown from its hinges, even if stock get behind it, or wind get in. The gate is hung by wire and chain, such as a picture frame. from the front end of the gate to the gate post can be a barbed wire.

Fasten the rope or wire G G, to a post 2 or 3 rods back from the gate and close to the road. Pull on the cord and it pulls on the lever F, which falls on a wire fastened to latch H. This pulls the latch out of the catch, J, and the pulling on cord G swings open the gate and the latch catches on the latch K. On passing through the gateway, pull on the cord G and it frees the gate, and it easily closes, being a gravity gate. The lever F is made of wood 1 1/2 inches in length, the short arm 8 in. long. The long arm, 12 fastened with a bolt.

Two forms of latches may be made; see cut. The rings, about 3 inch in diameter, may be purchased for 2 cents each. Both ring and lever latches act quickly, catching and holding the gate securely in place.

The enthusiasm which the citizens of Oregon have shown in cooperating with the state survey of mental feeble-mindedness and dependency has been so spontaneous that the preliminary work of obtaining a state-wide census of the mentally defective, feeble-minded and dependent individuals, will not be delayed. The survey is now extending its activities by inaugurating similar studies of the situation in specific localities. These have been selected because they were representative communities where it was reasonable to suppose that detailed figures would show a fair average, which would be especially well adapted for purposes of comparison with the results obtained from the statewide census survey. The leaders of this survey are redoubling their efforts to enlist the aid of every prominent citizen in each village, town, city and county, and any one who has not yet communicated with the state headquarters, Extension Division, University of Oregon, Eugene, is requested to do so at once.
